PROPOSED LEGISLATION





Meeting Minutes

ASIS CHAPTER 164 MARCH MEETING MINUTES

Chapter Chairman Darrell Clifton called the meeting to order at 1215 hours, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance, and individual introductions. Darrell reminded members of the dues requirements for both the local chapter level and the ASIS International level and encouraged any members who had not yet paid their dues to do so soon.

Jay Martin then spoke on possibilities of ASIS 164 hosting a Physical Security Program and about applying for a possible award for an available public-private partnership award, as well as applying to ASIS International for our annual opportunity to send one member of the ASIS Chapter 164 to the 2011 ASIS International's annual seminar this September in Orlando, Florida. Jay asked that interested members speak with him near the end of the meeting.



Darrell Clifton then asked for motions to approve the Treasury Report which was approved by Ken Lightfoot and seconded by Dean Hill. Darrell then asked for motions to approve February's Minutes which was motioned by Dennis Smith and seconded by Jesse Janzen. Both motions carried by unanimous consent.

Darrell then explained to the chapter members the pending ASIS Regional Chapter Officers Training being held at Circus-Circus Reno on April 4, 2011 and suggested that Chapter 164 authorize \$400 towards this event. Dean Hill called for a motion which was seconded by Robert Reeder and the motion was also carried by unanimous consent.

Ken Braunstein then covered current state legislative issues pending. Ken briefly discussed SB 81, AB-153 and AB 156, as well as some proposed changes to Nevada CCW laws.


