Roy Bordes Award

The Northern Nevada Chapter of ASIS International #164 presented the 3rd Annual Roy Bordes Award for Physical Security. This is a Chapter award granted each year to one Chapter in order to host a physical security workshop in honor of the late Roy Bordes—long time member of ASIS International and champion of physical security education. The Northern Nevada Chapter was honored to celebrate their 25th anniversary with their winning submission, which was sponsored by the ASIS Foundation.

The event was hosted at the Atlantis Resort Casino Spa over two days on November 7th and 8th and had members from across the country attend. A total of 43 security professionals attended and received specific instruction on a variety of physical security topics from two renowned physical security experts, Howard Moster, CPP and Basil Steele, CPP. In addition, Joe McDonald, CPP and member of the ASIS Board of Directors attended to provide the keynote address. The event is best summed up by one of the participants “this was one of the best educational sessions I have attended over the past 20 years of physical security education.”

Attendees also included four select physical security providers who attended not only the educational sessions, but also had exhibits set up for participants to view. 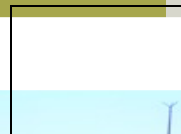
ASIS Chapter 164 Meeting Minutes
